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#### **Director of An Chomhairle retires**

Norma McDermott retired from the post of Director of An Chomhairle on 29th February 2012.

Mr Mark Dearey, Chairman of An Chomhairle, writes:

Norma McDermott joined An Chomhairle on 8<sup>th</sup> October 1984 as Librarian, having begun her career in libraries with the Tipperary Joint Libraries Committee.

Less than a year later, in June 1985, Norma was appointed the first Assistant Director of An Chomhairle, and she was appointed Director in 1993, following the retirement of Tom Armitage.



During Norma's years as Director remarkable changes have taken place in the Irish public library system. We now have a library service with buildings and services which are among the best, and this has been achieved in large measure due to the *Branching Out* programme, launched in 1998. Norma played a key role in the drafting of the *Branching Out* report, and her influence can be seen throughout the document. Her contribution was crucial to the success of the Branching Out strategy through her professionalism, determination, tenacity and sheer force of character.

Norma has always been respectful of, indeed she has promoted, the primacy of the local authority in the delivery of the library service. Her recommendations about the very many projects which came before An Chomhairle were based on what would deliver the best result for the library service and, of course, for the library user.

One of Norma's first responsibilities as librarian in An Chomhairle was for COLICO, and her commitment to COLICO and to library co-operation generally has been unwavering. She oversaw the drafting and publication of the first national cross-sectoral policy document on library co-operation in Ireland, *Joining Forces*, published by An Chomhairle in 1999. Norma developed close working relationships with colleagues in Northern Ireland, in Great Britain, and in Europe and she was not only a great ambassador for An Chomhairle, but a great ambassador for Irish libraries.

It is impossible to do justice to such a remarkable career in a few words but, fortunately, Norma's legacy to Irish libraries and librarianship is self-evident. Her influence was immense, and her legacy will be enduring.

I know I speak for each of the four Chairmen with whom Norma has served as Director that we could not have wished for a public servant with more integrity, honesty and soundness of judgement.

Norma is only the third holder of the office of Director of An Chomhairle Leabharlanna: she has performed that role with distinction and it has been an honour to Chair an organisation which she has led with such professionalism and integrity.

## **LGMA Libraries Development**

An Chomhairle Leabharlanna has confirmed that a new business function, *Libraries Development* is being established within the Local Government Management Agency (LGMA) which will continue the functions and work of An Chomhairle.

Among the services which will continue, are: the FÁS elearning at the Library programme; the Public Library Staff Training and Development Programme; the Children's and Young People Working Group; Borrowbooks.ie; Askaboutireland.ie; the collation of public library statistics; Irish Library News; librarybuildings.ie, and the PLR scheme.

Libraries Development will be staffed by a team of five staff from An Chomhairle, under the leadership of Acting Director Annette Kelly.

Contact details for the team remain as they are until further notice.

### Report published on library authority budgets for 2012

An Chomhairle Leabharlanna is pleased to publish the summary of the twenty fifth national annual statistical survey of public library authority budgets for the year 2012 based on the returns provided by all 32 library authorities.

The main features of the 2012 survey are that:

- Local authorities estimate that they will invest €136,986,763 of their revenue budgets on public library services in 2012. This represents a decrease of 2.6% on the 2011 figure of €140,600,898.
- Nine public library authorities have budgeted to spend more than in 2011 and twenty-three public library authorities have budgeted to spend less than in 2011.
- Total public library spending is down by 2.6% over the same period.
- Total local authority expenditure on library stock is set to decrease by **12.1%** on the 2011 figure.



The **2.6%** decrease in expenditure takes place in the context of a **4.8%** decrease in local authority recurrent expenditure on all services, including libraries.

Service indicators for recent years show that the number of visits to public libraries continues to grow. In this context, there is a danger that reduced funding for stock will make it more difficult for library services to meet the increased demand. It is crucial that funding for stock be protected so that library authorities can provide optimum value to the people, both young and old, whom they serve.

#### **Ghost Light** tops the most-borrowed chart for 2011

Joseph O'Connor's Ghost Light was the most borrowed book in Irish public libraries in 2011, according to figures published by the Library Council (2nd March).



The lending figures also show that it's not all about computer games and TV for Irish children as reading continues to be one of their favourite pastimes.

Children's authors once again dominated the 'most-borrowed-from-the-library' lists in Ireland's 350 public libraries in 2011.

Eight children's authors made it into the top ten 'most-borrowed-from-the-library' list for last year, with **Roderick Hunt**, author of over 300 titles in the Oxford Reading Tree series, the most popular for the third successive year with over 125,000 library loans.

Classic stories continue to delight today's children with stars such as Enid Blyton, Roger Hargreaves and Roald Dahl in the top ten, alongside Daisy Meadows, Francesca Simon, and Jacqueline Wilson. Adam Blade, author of 60 books in the <u>Beast Quest</u> fantasy series, entered the top 10 for the first time.

Prolific US writer James Patterson is the most popular adult fiction author for the second successive year with almost 74,000 library loans. Another American favourite, Nora Roberts, who also writes as J.D. Robb, is the second most-borrowed general fiction author with over 54,000 loans.

Irish writers and illustrators, both children's and adult, are attracting lots of Irish readers, with 15 featuring in the top 100.

<u>Darren Shan</u>, author of horror and fantasy books which have sold close to 15 million copies worldwide, is the most popular Irish author for the third year running.

Joseph O'Connor's *Ghost Light*, Dublin City's 'One City One Book' for 2011, was the nation's most borrowed book last year.

Reacting to the news, Mr O'Connor said:

"I'm deeply honoured that Ghost Light is the most borrowed book of 2011, and I offer a heartfelt thanks to my readers for making it so. All my life since childhood I have been a lover of our libraries. My novels have been researched in them, and I have many times been the beneficiary of the exceptional professionalism and helpfulness of our librarians. Now more than ever, I am proud to support the libraries and the wonderful work they do for their communities up and down the land."

Fiction continues to dominate and works by Irish authors are very popular, with 34 making it into the top 100. Room, the international bestseller and award-winning novel by Emma Donoghue is the second most borrowed fiction book by an Irish author.

The lists are compiled by The Library Council from information supplied to the <u>Public Lending Remuneration</u> (PLR) Scheme by all public libraries in Ireland.

10,229 authors resident in thirty-six countries were registered for Irish PLR in 2011. €179,047.46 was paid out to 4,047 authors in respect of their total library loans. Twelve authors received the maximum payment of €1,000, and the rate-per-loan was 5.21 cent.

Commenting on the third year of PLR, Mark Dearey, Chairman of The Library Council, thanked the country's librarians for their co-operation in the scheme:

"Irish public libraries are becoming even more popular each year as the 17 million visits and 15 million books borrowed show. Public library staff around the country should be very proud of the service they provide."

PLR is funded by the Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government.

# 250 children participate in National Engineers Week across Carlow Library Service

Over 250 children between 10 and 12 years of age attended a range of events hosted by Carlow Library Service as part of National Engineers Week. Engineers Week is a week long programme of nationwide events with the aim of celebrating the world of engineering in Ireland. The theme for

Engineers Week 2012 was "Connecting Our Lives" and Carlow Library Service hosted 6 events as part of this theme.

Lecturers from the Institute of Technology, Carlow visited Carlow Central Library and Tullow library

and covered a range of areas.

Mechanical Engineering lecturer, Joe Dillane visited Tullow library and provided a highly entertaining and informative talk on water – its source, supply and use. Over 100 children attended this event in Tullow library.

Electronic Engineering lecturer, Michael Mahon delivered a talk on the future of Electrical and Electronic Engineering while Mechanical Engineering lecturer, Andrew Keppel talked to the

This is the sixth successive year of these events and the programme is a key element of the National *Discover Science & Engineering* programme supported by Engineers Ireland and the Department of Education: Science, Forfás and a number of major engineering employers.

## Minister Officially Opens €1.6M Culturlann Sweeney in Kilkee

The €1.6m redevelopment of a 1950s public library building in Kilkee has resulted in the delivery of West Clare's foremost cultural and library facility. That's according to Mayor of Clare Cllr. Pat Hayes who joined Mr. Jimmy Deenihan, T.D. Minister for Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, in officially opening Cultúrlann Sweeney at O'Connell Street, Kilkee on 27 February 2012.

The 8,299 sq-ft development, which is almost double the size of the original Sweeney Memorial Public Library, comprises additional library space, theatre and exhibition space, and multi-functional spaces.



The new theatre and foyer/gallery facilities have been designed to accommodate approximately 110 people, while the number of books in the library stock exceeds 12,500.

The project was funded by Clare County Council, in association with the Charitable Commissioners of Ireland, as well as the Department of Arts, Heritage and the Gaeltacht, and the Department of Environment, Community and Local Government.

Speaking at the official opening ceremony, Minister Deenihan paid tribute to the project construction and design team which he said had contributed to the further enhancement of the range of services now being provided by Clare County Library and the Clare Arts Office.

Mayor of Clare Cllr Pat Hayes said: "The official opening of Culturlann Sweeney represents the completion of one of the biggest infrastructure projects to be undertaken in the West Clare area in recent years. The facility will greatly enhance the social infrastructure of the area and will help the future development of Kilkee and its environs."

Helen Walsh, County Librarian thanked the public "for their patience and understanding during the redevelopment process".

"The project has led to an improvement in the standard and range of independent functions within the building, allowing for different activities to occur independently. This new facility will play an important public and social role within the town", she added.

The Sweeney Memorial Library building dates to the 1950s and was designed to provide a range of functions, including a library, a theatre, a cinema, and a dance-hall and lecture room.

The library service was temporarily relocated to Kilkee Community Centre during construction, which commenced in January 2011.


## Clare County Library's branches emerging as Facebook favourites

## **Cork County Library gets crafty!**

During Year of Craft 2011, Cork County Library & Arts Service commissioned a number of artists to create unique craft pieces in collaboration with librarians and users in a number of branch libraries around the county. Recently two of these pieces were launched in West Cork, at Bantry and Skibbereen libraries.

In **Bantry Library**, <u>Brilliant Glass</u> is four pieces of fused glass created by local children at two workshops held in the library with artists Marie Brett and Michael Ray. The pieces are based on drawings and ideas from the children springing from characters and scenes in Roddy Doyles's short work Brilliant. The glass is an attractive addition to the children's area in Bantry which is an intrinsic part of the workshops and readings for children and adults during the annual <u>West Cork Literary Festival</u> each July.





In **Skibbereen Library** a storyteller's chair has been created by children from Abbeystrewry National School with local craftsperson <u>Alison Ospina</u>. The children during workshops with Alison created a greenwood chair using ideas from the children and their inspired directions on how it might be designed. Alison and the children also created an original storybook based around the chair itself. A handbound copy will be on display in the library and will be available for parents, grandparents and anyone else who wants to spin a yarn to their child. Printed copies of the book were also produced. The first of many storytelling sessions involving the storyteller's chair is

being held as part of the **Choowawaa!** arts event for children.

## Cork hosts Indexing, an exhibition on Sherkin Island

During the month of February 2012, Cork County Library and Arts Service hosted an exhibition with a difference. *Indexing*, an exhibition by students of BAVA on Sherkin Island, featured thirteen video art pieces, from thirty-seven seconds to seven minutes in length. The exhibition was launched by the Mayor of the County of Cork, Cllr Tim Lombard, on February 3. Also in attendance were the Cork County Manager, the Director of Services, members of the Library Committee, representatives from the DIT, the West Cork Arts Centre, the Sherkin Island Development Society, the Irish Museum of Modern Art and most importantly, the artists themselves, who travelled up from West Cork for the event.

The BA in Visual Art is an innovative honours degree programme delivered on Sherkin Island by Dublin Institute of Technology in collaboration with Sherkin Island Development Society and the West Cork Arts Centre.

The students were particularly pleased with the exhibition space at the County Library HQ, many expressing the view that their work looked and sounded better there than



they had ever seen it look or sound before. The exhibition was evocative and inspiring, and in many cases, showed how much fun art can be.

## **Dublin City's customer focused response to unemployment**

With rising unemployed figures and global economic uncertainty, Dublin City's Central Library has designed a *Career Direction & Development Programme*, a series of free lectures, interactive workshops, and helpdesks from relevant government agencies, together with user education

programmes and thematic information displays, all designed specifically for the unemployed. The programme's main aim is to provide free support to anyone, graduate or non-graduate, with professional expertise in sourcing and/or sustaining employment in challenging times. Additional aims include the provision of continuing education opportunities, volunteering positions and engagement with government certified initiatives, such Springboard, WebElevate and Get Ireland Online. The Careers Programme has recorded 2,029 participants since its inception, with 910

attending lectures/workshops, 827 availing of assistance on offer at helpdesks and 292 participating in the user education programmes.

This initiative complements an existing successful biannual *Start Your Own Business Programme* of free lectures, in association with Dublin City Enterprise Board. In 2011, a record number of 582 aspiring entrepreneurs attended the programmed events. This year's programme, which gets underway in April, will concentrate on innovative ways to overcome some of the challenges of starting a business in a recession while helping to turn ideas into new products and services.

Both programmes work well together and participants' testimonials are appreciative and encouraging: 'lots of tips, excellent speakers, well worth coming, thanks very much'; 'I attended a free talk given by Declan Farrell in the ILAC library a few days before an interview. 
## One Book One Ballyfermot - 2012

Between February 20 and March 30 the Ballyfermot reading initiative, *One Book One Ballyfermot*, is taking place. This is the third year of the literacy programme and the second year that it has included all the schools in the Ballyfermot area, as well as the Ballyfermot library and a host of community groups, parents, and of course the students themselves.

The reading drive was launched in The Base when a selection of students from the participating schools met to celebrate their reading of two books, Michael Morpurgo's *Kaspar Prince of Cats* and Marilyn Taylor's *17 Martin Street*. Students from primary and

The JCSP, or Junior Certificate Schools Programme, sponsors the Outreach through its JCSP Library in Kylemore College. The library links with the HSCL, Home School Community Liaison, and the School Completion Officer in the local schools, and the energy and drive of the HSCL's and the participating teachers is vital to the success of the programme. The involvement of local community groups and parents makes it a truly community literacy event.

The closing ceremony will take place on March 29<sup>th</sup> when it is hoped the author Marilyn Taylor will visit our display of art work and literary reviews with which we will celebrate our reading in the previous month.

One Book One Ballyfermot is a joint JCSP Library and HSCL Ballyfermot Schools initiative, widely supported by community groups and the local Ballyfermot public library.

## Can teenagers and senior citizens get along in the library?

In a new collection of essays entitled Partnerships and Collaborations in Library Public Communities: Resources and Solutions, Susan Lovatt, a librarian in Fingal County Malahide Libraries' demonstrates how these two groups can work together in a mutually beneficial way. In her essay Cross -Generational Learning Case Study: A Working Partnership between Malahide Library and Malahide (Post-Primary) Community School Susan describes how Transition Year students from the local community school pass on their technology skills



to senior citizens in the library. The TY students benefited by developing their communication and teaching skills and the senior citizens benefited by acquiring I.T. and Internet skills through this one to one coaching method.

However these two groups were not the only beneficiaries as the library also gained from this collaboration by having the technology needs of its members met by these young volunteer coaches. This partnership in Malahide Library is an innovative example of how a library and the local community can work together successfully and a resounding *yes!* to the question of whether teenagers and seniors citizens can get on together.


## **News from Kilkenny Libraries**

The sensory Room will be available for parents and carers of children with delayed development. It is equipped to assist children through play to develop and reach their full potential. There are various

items in the room which can assist a parent or carer to fine tune a child's coordination, sequencing, body awareness, visual stimulation, colour matching, cause and effect, counting, tactile abilities and so on. It can also be used to calm and relax a child. It takes the notion of disability out of the medical environment and puts it into a learning one. Leitrim County library expects that children using the sensory room will have the best chance to reach their full potential and will carry on being great library users.

Wexford's 1911 Lock-Out commemorations were centered on two weeks spanning late January and early February 2012 when the Lock-Out crisis there, which had started in August 1911, had peaked and a resolution found.

The library contribution to the programme included *The 1911 Lock Out Exhibition of local memorabilia* in Wexford Town Library for the fortnight, support for the publication of *Richard Corish – a biography*, by Kieran Roche [ISBN: 9781908817464], contribution to the seminar, *Wexford Foundry Workers – Men of Iron* on Saturday, 4th February and to the entertainment, *1911 Through Drama and Music*, that told the story of Wexford one hundred years ago. Local author Vonnie

Banville Evans read from her recent book, *What the Green Rushes Whisper*, a novel set in Wexford at that time. For children, Brian Gallagher read from his novel, set during the 1913 Dublin Lock-Out, *Across the Divide*. Throughout 2011, the oral history programme focused on recording the memories of senior citizens whose parents had been heavily involved in the struggle.
