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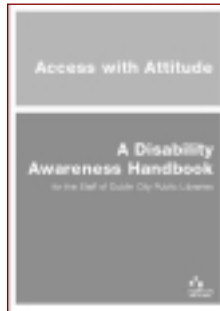
MAKING LIBRARY ACCESS HAPPEN

Mr. Dick Roche, T.D., Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government has announced funding for 2005 totalling €15 million to local authorities under the National Disability Strategy. The extra funding has been introduced to kick start a multi annual programme of initiatives by local authorities under the National Disability Strategy. The funding will be used for the provision of authority wide disability awareness training and initiation of the preparation of accessibility audits, adaptation of information systems and equipment for people with special needs, providing and improving, where needed, accessibility to public buildings, roads and pavements, parks, amenities, heritage sites and other public areas, including libraries, for which local authorities have responsibility. Included in this sum is an allocation of €25,000 to An Chomhairle Leabharlanna to enable it to expand its programme of initiatives contained in the report *Making access happen* to improve access for people with disabilities to local libraries. An Chomhairle will be extending its *Library access / Making access happen* initiative to nine authorities (Clare, Donegal, Limerick City, Longford, Meath, Roscommon, South Dublin, Tipperary and Wicklow), following on from the success of Phase 1 which was based on Cavan, Kildare and Mayo County Libraries and Dublin City Libraries and Archives.

Dublin City Public Libraries (DCPL) have produced *Access with attitude: a disability awareness handbook for the staff of Dublin City Public Libraries* as an outcome of the Reasonable Accommodation Project. It was further informed by the experiences and feedback from over 300 attendees at Disability Awareness Training sessions delivered by the DCPL RAG (Reasonable Accommodation Group) during 2004. This group continues and has become embedded in the DCPL working group structure, its status having transferred from pilot project to mainstream service status. Its present action plan ranges from the production of a plain language, illustrated guide, *How to Use the Library*, to progressing the formulation of inclusive focus groups for people with disabilities. ACTIVE CITIZENSHIP AND LITERACY

The week beginning September 26th sees the start of National Adult Literacy Awareness Week (NALAW) 2005 with its theme of Active citizenship and literacy.

NALAW 2005 will focus on people working in the public, political and NGO sectors involved with activity citizenship. The intention is to assist them to deal more effectively and sensitively with 500,000 (OECD 1997) members of the public who have low literacy levels. NALAW will be raising the issue of literacy as a barrier to involvement in / and or understanding of:

- the political system - from voting to membership of a political party;
- major government funded organisations such health authorities and county councils;
- the role of statutory and regulatory organisations;
- voluntary sector - from volunteering to how they are funded and use their resources; and
- local communities - from residents associations to the role of community development organisations.

NALAW 2005 will specifically involve:

- a half-day national conference on the 30th September at the National College of Ireland.
 - the launch of 'Simply Put' - an interactive tool on how to use plain English;
 - the launch of 'Know your EU' - a guide to the EU for adult learners;
 - the production of printed promotional material (postcard and A4 poster) about the campaign; and
 - various media related announcements.

PLR AND OTHER INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY LEGISLATION FLAGGED

The Government has announced its intention to bring forward legislation to provide several new schemes covering intellectual property issues, including a Public Lending Right payments scheme for authors whose works are lent by Irish public libraries. The Government's exemption of public libraries from the implementation of earlier EU legislation on PLR brought it into conflict with the Commission. Following a full review of the situation, the Department of Enterprise, Trade and Employment has now concluded that the early provision of a system of payments to authors is necessary to resolve the situation.

Other proposals included an artists' resale right payment scheme and measures aimed at tackling counterfeiting and piracy by enforcing intellectual property rights.

Announcing the plans on Monday 1st August, Minister for Trade and Commerce, Mr. Michael Ahern, T.D., said, 'The new schemes involve the responsibilities of several Ministers. Therefore, active inter-Departmental co-operation will be needed...' The Minister hoped to be in a position to bring the intended bill to the Oireachtas before the end of the year.

Representatives of the Irish Writers' Union are seeking to meet Enterprise Minister Micheal Martin T.D., to ensure that writers' interests are taken fully into account when PLR regulations are drawn up.

THE SEPTEMBER PROJECT

This is a grassroots effort to encourage public events on freedom, democracy, and citizenship in libraries on or around September 11. *September Project* events are activities of reflection, discussion, and dialogue about the meaning of freedom, the role of information in promoting active citizenship, and the importance of literacy in making sense of the world around us. Events take place on September 11, on the weekend of September 11, or throughout the month of September. In other words, whenever it works best for your library and community. Libraries around the world are collaborating with organisations to host public and campus events, such as: displays about human rights and historical documents; talks and performances about freedom and cultural difference; and film screenings about issues that matter. SURVEY OF ATTITUDES TOWARDS LIBRARIES IN GALWAY CITY

In a survey of attitudes toward libraries in Galway carried out by students of Lehigh University, Pennsylvania, a majority (87%) of respondents agreed that *My library is a community space for educational and cultural activities*. A slightly larger percentage of users (95%) versus non-users (80%) agreed with the statement. This figure, according to the researchers, suggests that the library's initiative to establish itself as a prominent community space has been successful even in the minds of those who do not use its resources.

To the statement *My library provides a comfortable setting and I enjoy spending time there*, 79% of all respondents agreed. 91% of library users supported this view, with 71% of non-users agreeing. In a question on non-users' attitudes toward reading and libraries, 81% of people who do not use a library regularly suggested that they feel comfortable in a public library, with 88% suggesting that they had previously been to a library and found that the library resources did meet their needs.

The findings are in line with the national public library-user survey conducted in 2002, which found that that over 80% of library users in Galway city and county consider the local library service to be good or very good, and 84% of users rated 'staff helpfulness' as very good.

The surveying team from Lehigh University were enrolled in the Irish Studies summer program at NUI Galway. They were working under the direction of Vincent G. Munley, Iacocca Professor of Business and Economics at Leigh University. It was one of three surveys which they carried out in cooperation with Galway City Council.

SERVICE INDICATORS PUBLISHED

The first national set of service indicators for local authority services¹ have been presented to the Minister for the Environment, Heritage and Local Government by the Local Government Management Services Board. This survey contains 42 checks against which local authority services are measured. Five of these relate to public libraries:

- Opening hours
 - Average number per week for full-time libraries
 - Average number per week for part-time libraries
- Number of registered members as a percentage of the local population
- Issues
 - Number of books issued per head of population
 - Other items issued per head of population
- Percentage of libraries that offer Internet access to the public
- Number of Internet sessions provided per 1,000 population.

The purpose of service indicators is to inform local management of levels of performance and to identify areas that may require review and / or additional resources. Their value increases over time as trends become apparent.

As authorities build up a databank over the years these indicators should be seen as providing vital management information at local level.

The Marian Finucane radio show's last book club programme for the season was broadcast live from **Monaghan County Library's** headquarters in Clones. Each month on the show, Marian invited members of book clubs/reading groups to be guest book reviewers on the programme. This month it was the Clones Book Club who reviewed *Shadow of the Wind* by Carlos Luis Zafon and *Gilead* by Marilynne Robinson.

Deirdriú McQuaid, Assistant Librarian with Monaghan County Library Services describes the background to the day's events:

One does not realise the amount of preparatory work that goes into producing such a show until it is seen at firsthand. Library staff liaised with the programme researchers, producer and the participants on the show. ISDN lines and email facilities were put in place so that Marian could receive comments from the public during the show. The day before the broadcast, RTÉ technicians arrived at library headquarters with reels of cables, sound equipment, telephones, microphones and converted what is normally known as the stock room into a broadcasting studio.

On the day, despite the typical Irish weather, everyone involved, though nervous, was very upbeat and excited and raring to go! While the news headlines were being read, Marian briskly stepped her way up the winding stairs to the library headquarters and greeted everyone involved, as she took her seat and put on her headphones.

Marian began the show by speaking to John and Mary from the Knockatallon Development Company. The subject of conversation centred on the point that parts of the Knockatallon area are more northern than parts of Northern Ireland itself. With the closing of the border roads during the troubles, these areas experienced severe hardship both economically and socially, with businesses shutting down, community halls and centres left in dereliction as a result. So a committee of local people in the Knockatallon area got together to do something about their Old Hall and set about applying for funding to regenerate it and the area. As a result they now have the fabulous Slieve Beagh Tourism Centre, which has ensuite rooms, bar, restaurant and a function room.

In the next part of the show members of the Clones Book Club gave their views on the two selected books. The Clones Book Club was set up one and half years ago, with the help of the

Clones Community Forum Office. The Club meets once a month in a room in the Forum's office's on the Diamond, where the members review their selected books. A member of staff from the Clones library helps to get the selected books, poetry, reviews on selected books/authors and attends the meeting of the club. The show ended with Sr. Celine, from the Castleblayney Arts and Community Centre speaking about the very exciting new Arts Centre in Castleblayney, which will also house the new

Castleblayney Library. As time had run out, this conversation was brief and that was the end of show but before signing off, Marian announced the new opening hours for Clones library, which came into effect from the week beginning 30th May 2005.

Afterwards, the library staff in their usual form, put on a beautiful spread of tea/coffee and 'fussies'. Marian joined in with the staff and the participants of the show.

It was a great day for Monaghan County Library Services. So far, reaction to the programme has been positive and we hope that more programmes will follow.

Clare County Library recently completed its Tithe Applotment Books Transcription Project. The Tithe Applotment Books (TAB) were compiled between 1823 and 1837 in order to establish the amount landholders were required to pay towards the upkeep of the Church of Ireland. The taxable land in each parish was surveyed, giving the names of the occupiers of land in each townland, the acreage and class of land they held, and the amount of taxes (tithes) they were liable for. The original manuscript books are held in the National Archives in Dublin. The Tithe Applotment Books are an important pre-Famine source for family history and landholding patterns, but do not give information on the landless or those living in settlements. They also document the pre-Ordnance Survey townland names, many of which have now disappeared.

The Clare Tithe Applotment Books Transcription Project aimed to make the names of landholders and landlords listed in the Tithe Applotment Books for County Clare available online. The Project came about as a result of a discussion on the Clare mailing list of the *Rootsweb* genealogy website, where people interested in Clare genealogy were discussing possible ways of getting more Clare genealogical data online. An approach was made by Paddy Casey, a *Rootsweb* member, to Clare County Library in January 2004, which agreed to co-ordinate the project, under the management of Executive Librarians Maureen Comber and Anthony Edwards, assisted by Jackie Dermody and Ciara Barry. Clare County Library divided the parishes into manageable blocks. Volunteers were sought to transcribe copies of the original documents. They were asked to transcribe data in blocks of townlands and could select which lot of townlands they wished to transcribe. Within four months of the commencement of the project, all lots had been assigned. Guidelines for volunteers were developed by the library, and by feedback from the earliest set of volunteers. Data returned by volunteers (in a variety of electronic formats) was checked, converted to HTML and posted on the library's website by library staff. A record of the progress of the project was maintained on the website, and a chronological guide to posted parishes was also maintained. The final two parishes were uploaded on the 4th July 2005.

The response to the library's call for volunteers was overwhelming, and extremely encouraging. It showed what can be achieved in a short space of time by co-operation between volunteers from all parts of the globe, and a public institution such as Clare County Library. The Tithe Applotment Books for County Clare would not now be available online, free of charge, without this co-operation. It is indeed an achievement to be proud of for all concerned. Clare County Library is extremely grateful to all who volunteered to participate in this project. Go raibh mile maith agaibh go léir.

Amongst its activities the **Irish Hospice Foundation** engages in education and awareness raising about hospice, death, dying and bereavement. As part of the Foundation's current outreach programme it provides a number of recommended booklists for the general public and for professionals who work with bereaved people.

On September 8th there will be a formal launch of the Foundation's reading list and loan service:

- Four reading lists for the general public on *Death and bereavement*, *Bereaved by suicide*, *Talking to children about loss and death*, and *Stories for young children about loss and death*, and
- Three lists of books aimed at professionals on *Death and bereavement for professionals*, *Death, bereavement and suicide for general practitioners and Loss and grief in the workplace*.

The books may also be borrowed from the Thérèse Brady Library from September 8, 05 (administration and postage cost). The service will be available to residents of the Republic of Ireland only. Breda works alongside the WEB (Whitechurch-Edmondstown-Ballyboden) project in Whitechurch Library and is a very able facilitator of the local history group there. The group meets every Thursday to share their memories of their community in times past and it soon became obvious to Breda that the wealth of local history information available was not being fully tapped into with the time and resources available. Information technology was the only way to go and hence the idea of *Computers for the terrified* was born.

Breda, who has an MA in Adult Education, teaches the course herself and has ensured that it receives FETAC accreditation.

An awards ceremony for up to 40 people took place in Whitechurch Library on Thursday 14th July where certificates were presented by Minister Seamus Brennan. The nation's media descended on the library as word went round that the most mature lady who would receive a certificate would turn 99 years old the next day.

At the launch in Castlerea library County Librarian, Richie Farrell, commented 'The training and upskilling of our staff to deliver these services is an integral part of the process and I want to pay tribute to the staff for the way they have embraced these new initiatives.'

The official launch of *Inspiration*, the art exhibition of the Western Region of FARA (Federation of Active Retired Association) took place in Roscommon County Library on May 30th. The exhibition, which consisted of 180 paintings in total, was shown in Roscommon and Ballaghaderreen libraries where members of the public were invited to vote on their favourite. The winning artist at each site was awarded the People's Prize.

Ballaghaderreen library also hosted the launch of two books, *Under the Shadows of Summerhill* by Máire McDonnell Garvey and a re-issue of a *Collection of Traditional Irish Dance Music* by the late P.J. Giblin. Master of ceremonies at the launch was Richie Farrell who said that such events were an important part of the library calendar of events, and were a contribution to community social life.

The *George Harding Perfect Parody* competition is being run in conjunction with the conference. This competition is sponsored by Harding Books and has many excellent prizes. Expectations and experiences: children, childhood and children's literature: the IRSC (International Research Society for Children's Literature) is holding its 17th biennial congress in Trinity College, Dublin from 13 August to 17 August. This is the first time the congress of this leading international society which encourages the study of children's literature has been held in Ireland.

The keynote speakers are Declan Kiberd who will talk about *Childhood and Ireland*, Anne Higonnet who will raise questions about controversial images of childhood, and poets Michael Rosen and Paul Muldoon who will discuss poetry and children, and read from their own work.

The theme, *Expectations and experiences: children, childhood and children's literature* provoked a great deal of interest in its sub-themes which range from childhood and families, aspects of morality in and about children's literature, depictions of children and childhood in books and other media, and theories of child development and play related to writing for young people, to considerations of oral culture and traditional tales.
